For the good if the piece, we all felt, the story needed to be told in a more authentic way.

That brings us to today, and City Lights' wonderful partnership with our neighbors and friends at Teatro Visión. They center the culture of the characters in their work, and have a true understanding of the voices in this story. We're honored to co-produce *Miss You Like Hell* together.

Los Artistas

Quiara Alegría Hudes (Book and Lyrics) is a writer, strong wife and mother of two, barrio feminist and native of West Philly, U.S.A. Hailed for her work's exuberance, intellectual rigor, and rich imagination, her plays and musicals have been performed around the world. They include Water By the Spoonful, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Drama; In the Heights, winner of the Tony Award for Best Musical and Pulitzer finalist; and Elliot, A Soldier's Fugue, another Pulitzer finalist. Her most recent musical, Miss You Like Hell, appeared Off-Broadway at New York's Public Theater. Originally trained as a composer, Hudes writes at the intersection of music and drama. She has collaborated with renowned musicians including Nelson Gonzalez, Michel Camilo, Lin-Manuel Miranda, Erin McKeown, and The Cleveland Orchestra. Hudes recently founded Emancipated Stories, which seeks to put a personal face on mass incarceration by having inmates share one page of their life story with the world.

Erin McKeown (music & lyrics) is a musician, writer, and producer known internationally for her prolific disregard of stylistic boundaries. Her brash and clever electric guitar playing is something to see. Her singing voice is truly unique – clear, cool, and collected. A familiar presence on NPR and the BBC, McKeown's songs have also appeared on numerous television shows and commercials. She has spent the last decade and a half playing nearly 200 shows a year while releasing 9 studio albums and refining a distinct and challenging mix of American musical styles. McKeown's first original musical, Miss You Like Hell, cowritten with Tony & Pulitzer winner Quiara Alegria Hudes, had its world premiere in the Fall of 2016 at the La Jolla Playhouse. It opened Off-Broadway at The Public Theater in the spring of 2018 where it was nominated for 3 Outer Critics Circle Awards (Best Musical, Best Book of a Musical, Best Score) and 5 Drama Desk Awards (including Best Music, Best Lyrics, Best Orchestrations). While a student at Brown University, Erin spent three years as an artist in residence at Providence, RI's revolutionary community arts organization, AS220. An active voice on social justice issues and culture, Erin was a 2011-12 fellow at Harvard's Berkman Klein Center for Internet and Society, and she has blogged and hosted for WNYC New York Public Radio. A former board member of the Future of Music Coalition, McKeown has also worked closely with a range of non-profits focusing on her core concerns of media justice and immigration reform.



Rodrigo García (Director/Artistic Director) is an accomplished actor, educator, translator, and director. He graduated from the National Institute of Fine Arts in Mexico City in modern dance and drama. He has trained with Double Edge Theater, De'll arte International School of Physical Theatre, Le Théâtre du Soleil, Sojourn Theater, and Julian Boal. For Teatro Visión he has translated into Spanish the works of Rudolfo Anaya (Bless Me Ultima), Octavio Solís (Ghosts of the River), Leonard Madrid (Perla) and Victor Hugo Rascón Banda (The Woman Who Fell From The Sky), and helped develop the Spanish adaptation of Sandra Cisnero's

The House on Mango Street. His directing credits include Teatro Visión's Departera: the Road to the Afterlife, Macario 2014-2019, La Muerte Baila, Breaking Through (Santa Clara University), American Night: the Ballad of Juan José (Los Altos Stage), Yerma (San José State University), Canción de Cuna Para Un Niño Herido, Carlota, Una Tierra Llamada Mañana, Érase Una Vez Un Camino Amarillo, Un Sueño en Cualquier Lugar, Sucedió en la Revolución and Divas a Belén (Teatro Alebrijes). Rodrigo is also co-founder and Director of Teatro Alebrijes. He was named SV Artist Laureate in 2020 and SV Creative Ambassador in 2019. Rodrigo is Theater Communications Group (TCG) fellow, a

graduate of 1st Act Silicon Valley's Multicultural Arts Leadership Institute (MALI) Class 2009, and a member of the National Association for Latino Arts and Culture (NALAC). He dedicates this show to his parents, and the memory of his brother Francisco who was always a big supporter of his work.

Samuel Cisneros (Music Director, Keyboards) returned to City for last season's *Fun Home* after several years away, and is pleased to be a part of the *Miss You Like Hell* team. Before *Fun Home*, he was seen/heard as Music Director of the amazing sold-out show that was *In the Heights*. A San José Native, Samuel is a full-time musician whose work includes musical accompanist for Bellarmine College Prep and pianist for Ladera UCC Church in Ladera.

Ivette Deltoro (Managing Director) has been a part of the Bay Area theatre community since 2011, with work both on stage and behind the scenes. A graduate of the Foothill Theatre Conservatory, her main focus was in acting but soon expanded to other administrative aspects of theatre-making. She is a passionate proponent of equity, diversity, and inclusion practices, with a particular interest in the inclusion of intimacy direction and safety practices within the community. Apart from her work with Teatro Visión, Ivette also serves as the Casting Assistant with City Lights Theater Company. Since 2013, she has been deeply involved in multi-department administrative and artistic decisions within the company. She was also a co-creator of the Mini Lights Emerging Artist pilot program. Onstage credits include Anne Boleyn in *Anne of the Thousand Days* with Dragon Productions, as well as Avery in *Rapture, Blister, Burn*, and Caroline in *I and You*, both with City Lights Theater Company. She has also worked behind the scenes as an assistant director, assistant stage manager, and props designer. Ivette holds a B.S. in Family and Human Development from Arizona State University. She looks forward to many more bright years at City Lights and Teatro, and she thanks you for supporting live theater in San José!

Ron Gasparinetti (City Lights Production Manager) hails originally from Newark, NJ, and has been part of the Bay Area theater community for 25 years now. He not only serves as City Lights' Production Manager and Resident Scenic Designer but also holds the positions of Technical Director, Venue Manager, and most recently, Covid Safety Manager. Ron became a part-time employee for the company in 2012 and has since graduated to the full-time positions he currently holds. His first show with City Lights was What the Butler Saw in 2006; he has designed almost every show here since then. He has been honored many times as a TBA Award finalist for Outstanding Scenic Design. He garnered the award in 2019 for his design of Mothers & Sons, presented here at City Lights as did his design for Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf? at Los Altos Stage Company in 2015. In April 2016, he was honored with the title of Artist Laureate by SVCreates. Ron discovered the joy of hiking in 2019 and now serves as Secretary on the Board of Directors for the San Francisco Hiking Club.

Ben Hemmen (Stage Manager) returns to stage manage his first musical at City Lights for Miss You Like Hell. The last time he was actually in a musical was many moons ago, and his first show was deck crew for Once upon a Mattress. Ben also has a long history of lighting shows as well. Karen S. Leonard (Properties Designer) loves showing off her creativity and is grateful to be working again with the terrific artists at City Lights, where she last worked on *The Thanksgiving Play*. Earlier this year she created props for Sunnyvale Community Players' *Songs for a New World*, which she also stage managed; *Radium Girls* at Foothill College; and *Fun*

Home, Vietgone, The Hollow, and Native Gardens at City Lights. Karen has been involved with several Bay Area theatre groups since 1992. She is a director, stage manager, actor, and properties creator. Up next she will be stage managing and creating props for Next to Normal at SCP. When the pandemic hit, she was directing and creating props for Sister Act at Stage 1 Theatre. Karen is a court-appointed special advocate, the Properties Supervisor for SCP, and the owner of TwoLs Photography.

Spenser Matubang (Lighting Designer) is a freelance lighting and projections designer based in Oakland, California. They have been working in professional Bay Area theater for four years and received their degree in Theater Arts from the University of California, Santa Cruz in 2020. Spense uses their career as a never-ending outlet for exploration, creative experimentation, and community building. They have previously designed for The Chikahan Company, City Lights Theater Company, EnActe Arts, Town Hall Theater Company, Ferocious Lotus, New Conservatory Theatre Center, and Jewel Theatre.

George Psarras (Sound Designer) has designed and/or written music for over 50 shows at City Lights, and has been the company's Resident Sound Designer since 2011. He is a four-time TBA Award winner for Outstanding Sound Design (Tier 2), for Eurydice, Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde, Truce: A Christmas Wish From the Great War (world premiere), and Amadeus -- all at City Lights. Also an actor, George works in theatre, voiceover, film, commercials, and video games.

Micaela Keiko Sinclair (Scenic Designer) is a Bay Area-based scenic designer who dabbles in props, costumes, and production management. Micaela's recent designs include A Picture of Two Boys with New Conservatory Theatre Company, Rent with Landmark Musical Theatre, Antigone, presented by the girls of St. Catherine's with Town Hall Theatre Company, and 'Da Kink In My Hair at UCSC. Upcoming projects include Tick, Tick... Boom! at New Conservatory Theatre Center, The Oresteia at Woodside Priory, and Crumbs from the Table of Joy at Town Hall Theatre Company. Melissa Sanchez (Costume Designer) has worked on numerous productions including The Grapes of Wrath (Los Altos Stage Company); Jekyll & Hyde, LIZZIE, Cabaret, and Vietgone (City Lights); Macario, La Muerte Baila, and Departera (Teatro); A Doll's House, Part Two, and Act of God (Palo Alto Players); Laughter on the 23rd Floor (Hillbarn Theatre); and The Circuit (Santa Clara University). She holds a BA in Technical Theatre with an emphasis in Costume Design from San Francisco State University, and she is the Assistant Costume Rentals Manager at TheatreWorks Silicon Valley.

Dianne Vega (Teatro Visión Production Manager) has been working with Teatro Visión since 1994. In addition to managing the production aspects of many shows over the years with Teatro Visión, her stage management credits include *The Cook, Cantinflas!*, *The Kiss of the Spider Woman, La Posada Mágica, Harvest Moon, La Muerte Baila, Macario*, and numerous shows when the company performed in downtown San José before their move to the Mexican Heritage Plaza in 1999. During her time at Teatro Visión, Dianne developed a technical theater program for youth, coordinated new work development projects with nationally known Latinx playwrights, and coordinated our Centro de Bienestar Elders Story Legacy Project partnership with Garden Health Center. In addition to Teatro Visión, Dianne has worked with various theater companies throughout the Bay Area since 1989, including 2019 Regional Tony-winning Theatreworks Silicon Valley. Dianne's service to the theater profession includes a term on the Theatre Services Committee for Theatre Bay Area and membership in the Production Manager Forum BIPOC committee. She recently gave a

seminar on production management for theater majors at Yale. Dianne holds a B.A. in Social Work from San José State University.

Jacob Yoder-Schrock (Community Engagement and Marketing Manager) is a multidisciplinary theater-maker with a passion for collaborative, community-based work. Before joining the Teatro Visión team, he worked as a program leader for South County Cal-SOAP and YMCA of Silicon Valley, where he developed an elementary arts-based curriculum for social-emotional learning. Past theater production credits include directing *Pullman, WA* by Young Jean Lee and several collaboratively developed projects, including *This Could Be Something, Do Your Happy Dance, Jerichol*, and *Phases*, which was created with high school students in Gilroy. He is overjoyed to be a part of the *Macario* team this year. He dedicates his work on this production to the memory of his Tío Toph, who was always an enthusiastic believer in his theatrical work.

Lisa Mallette (City Lights Executive Artistic Director) has been at the helm of City Lights Theater Company since 2001. Under her leadership, the company has experienced nearly two decades of uninterrupted artistic and administrative development, and it continues to grow and earn widespread public and industry acclaim for innovative management, fiscal responsibility, and artistic reach. Lisa has overseen the successful staging of over 100 provocative and acclaimed productions during her tenure, and she has directed or appeared in nearly three dozen. She has served as chair of the Theatre Bay Area board of directors and has been a longtime member of the TBA Theatre Services Committee; she sits on the Leigh Weimers Emerging Artists Selection Committee of the San José Rotary; she is a 2009 graduate of the esteemed Community Leadership San José program; and she is a 2014 Silicon Valley Artist Laureate. Lisa is a widely recognized expert and frequently sought speaker on strategic planning, audience engagement, board development, and team motivation. She lives in San Mateo with her two children, Sophie and Olivia.

Anne Younan (City Lights General Manager) has been a member of the City Lights team for over twenty-five years – most recently as Development Director from 2015-2018, and General Manager as of the 17-18 season. For Anne and City Lights, it all began 31 years ago when she appeared in A Girl's Guide to Chaos, followed quickly by Mrs. California, Remembrance, Joined at the Head, Definitely Not a Christmas Carol, Nutcracker This!, and Circles. Other favorite turns on the City Lights stage include Birth, Dead Man Walking, the mischievous ringleader Chris in 2016's Calendar Girls, and yet another mischievous Chris in the world premiere of Coded in both 2020 and 2021. She thanks her husband, Paul, and two children, Sarah and Jake, for encouraging her to follow her bliss by working for a company that continues to inspire her and so many others in the valley. About Teatro Visión

Teatro Visión's mission is to create theater rooted in Chicanx and Latinx experiences to inspire the people of Santa Clara Valley and beyond to feel, think, and act to create a better world.

Teatro Visión was founded in 1984 (as Teatro Huipil) by members of Women in Teatro, a statewide network of Chicano theaters. Based in San José, California, Teatro Visión has developed, commissioned, and/or produced more than 60 plays — with performances in both English and Spanish — for an audience of more than 150,000 patrons. These works include the world premiere of *Departera* by Evelina Fernández, created from stories gathered from our community; the world premiere of B.
